

THE NUTCRACKER CHRISTMAS CONCERT

WELCOME

Welcome to our Christmas concert which marks the opening of our 73rd Orchestral Season. We start this season with a change and I would like to take this opportunity to thank Brian Waters, our chairman for the last 10 successful years, for the energy and drive he brought to the role and the support he has given this wonderful orchestra. We wish Brian all the best in his retirement and welcome our new chairman Dr John Caroe, a highly valued member of the orchestra.

We begin our concert with the Overture to Zampa, an opera-comique from the early 19th century by the French composer Ferdinand Hérold. The opera tells the story of seduction, squandered fortunes and pirates having lost his fortune a young count abandons a girl, changes his name and runs off to sea to become the Pirate Zampa. Love triangles, long-lost brothers and hastily concocted marriage ceremonies abound before, in the final scene, the statue of Zampa's abandoned lover comes to life and whisks him to hell for his indiscretions, akin to the ending of Mozart's Don Giovanni. This rambunctious overture is possibly Hérolds most famous work and I'm sure you will get a sense of the comic plot through the performance.

Fantasia on Greensleeves is included tonight by special request from our ECO Friends, who having heard our performance in the 2019 Christmas concert got in touch and asked us to play it again as they enjoyed it so much. Vaughan Williams once commented, "The art of music above all arts is the expression of the soul of the nation". He manages to capture the very essence of England in music in this work. He not only uses the traditional tune in the title but also the melody 'Lovely Joan' which the composer came across in Suffolk and added to his collection of English folk songs.

The headline piece of the concert, the much loved Christmas-inspired classic, The Nutcracker, ends our first half. The story is set on Christmas Eve at the foot of a giant Christmas tree in a child's imagination. Featuring a Mouse King, a Prince, a Sugarplum Fairy, a Land of Snow and a Land of Sweets, complete with Marzipan castle, this fantastical story is vividly brought to life by Tchaikovsky's magnificent score.

Tchaikovsky took 8 movements from the ballet prior to its premiere to create a concert suite. In the first instance the suite was much more popular than the full ballet. The character dances and the Waltz of the Flowers in the suite are all taken from the second act of the ballet when Clara and the Nutcracker Prince return to the Land of Sweets. The overture and the march are taken from the beginning, before magic transforms the toys into living beings.

Disney made use of the majority of the suite in his 1944 animated classic Fantasia. Images of dancing mushrooms, fairies, fish and cossack dancing thistles may spring to mind when listening to our performance.

Victor Hely-Hutchinson was a British composer from the first half of the twentieth century. Growing up between Kent and Cape Town he was a child prodigy, composing and performing at a very young age. He studied conducting at the Royal College of Music under Adrian Boult and joined the BBC in 1926 as a conductor, pianist, and accompanist. In the early 1940s he became the Professor of Music at Birmingham University before returning to the BBC as its Musical Director. Best known for this Carol Symphony he did write other music for film and television and had various pieces performed at the BBC proms, although he wasn't overly fond of a lot of his musical output. He developed pneumonia in the harsh Winter of 1947 as a result of refusing to switch the radiators on in his office to save fuel during rationing and subsequently died in March of that year at the age of 45.

His Carol Symphony from 1927 is in four movements based on traditional English Christmas carols. The movements are more akin to Chorale Fantasies than traditional symphonic movements. O Come All Ye Faithful, The First Nowell and Here we come a-wassailing all feature.

You may also recognise the third movement as the theme to 'The Box of Delights' which was heard on Children's Hour on BBC radio and reused in the television adaptation in 1984.

Mascagni wrote the opera Cavalleria Rusticana for a competition for new opera composers in Italy in 1888. He only found out about the competition two months before the closing date for submission and entered a rushed collaboration with his librettist, sometimes only receiving a few lines of text at a time on the back of a postcard. Mascagni had a crisis of confidence and hid the score away rather than submit it for the competition, but his wife found the manuscript and sent it in just before the deadline. The work was accepted as a finalist and performed in Rome to thunderous applause and numerous curtain calls in 1890 - needless to say it won the competition and has been a staple in the opera repertoire since. By the time of the composer's death in 1945 it had been performed more than 14000 times in Italy alone.

Camelot is one of the final shows to come out of the prodigious Broadway partnership of Lerner and Loewe. The musical premiered in 1960 with Julie Andrews and Richard Burton in the leading roles and despite initially running to over four hours received great acclaim from critics and won four Tony awards. The show has been revived several times, including most recently in 2023, and was adapted into a film in 1967. A 2003 review noted, "this musically rich, legend-based classic evokes enough swashbuckling spectacle to keep one smiling. And for lovers of dime-store romance, Camelot has it all...Camelot features a score rich in English country-tune charm by Mr. Loewe. Its lyrics, by Mr. Lerner, never fail to dazzle with their virtuosity and wit."

I'm sure you will recognise the rich melodies, in particular the famous 'lf ever I would leave you' and the title song 'Camelot'.

We end our concert this evening with the orchestra's traditional 'Sleigh Ride' as our way of wishing you, and yours, a very Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.
